Interim Director of Outreach & Community Relations Bilingual Community Relations Specialist New Jersey Division on Civil Rights

Tisha M. Leonardo-Santiago (she/they) is the Interim Director of Outreach & Community Relations and Bilingual Community Relations Specialist in New Jersey Division on Civil Rights' Community Relations Unit. A second-generation Latinx Hudson County native and a first-generation college graduate earning their undergraduate and graduate degrees in Criminal Justice from New Jersey City University.

In 2017, Tisha joined DCR as a Bilingual Investigator in the Enforcement Unit, served as the bilingual subject matter expert for the New Jersey Bias Investigation Access System (NJBIAS) Project that launched in November 2020, and now serves as the Statewide NJBIAS Community Liaison for the online complaint portal.

Tisha is based in Newark, and primary counties are Bergen, Hudson, Hunterdon, Passaic, Sussex and Union. Tisha leads their unit's strategic planning and programming initiatives on breastfeeding, pregnancy, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity and expression, national origin, nationality, ancestry, and religion (Islam). Tisha serves as the subject matter expert on Youth, Higher Education, Prisons and Policing, Latino/a/x, LGBTQI+, Muslim and Immigrant communities. They also serve as the DCR Youth Ambassador Program Coordinator.

Patricia D. Williamson is a Community Relations Specialist in the new unit under the Division on Civil Rights, in the NJ Department of Law and Public Safety.

Prior to this position, Patricia was the New Jersey Counts Project Director at the New Jersey Institute for Social Justice, where she led the work to ensure a complete and accurate count of New Jersey's urban communities in the 2020 Census.

Patricia worked for over 20 years in the telecommunications arena as a systems engineer in the optical networking area. She is also an adjunct professor at Bloomfield College.

Patricia earned a BA in Mathematics from Hampton University, an MS in Computer Science from Howard University, and an MA in Education and Human Development in the Educational Technology Leadership Program at The George Washington University.



Lora Fong

Assistant Attorney General, Keynote Speaker

Lora Fong is an Assistant Attorney General and serves as the Chief Diversity, Equity, & Inclusion Officer for the Department of Law and Public Safety, responsible for developing and implementing the agency's strategic diversity and inclusion initiatives.

Before joining the department in 2016, Ms. Fong practiced law both in private practice law firms and as in-house counsel in multi-national corporations. She also has served as the general counsel of an entrepreneurial

multi-media company and as a consultant to members of the Fortune 500 on diversity, equity, and inclusion.

Ms. Fong has been recognized as a Distinguished Leader of the Bar by the New Jersey Law Journal, was awarded the Mel Narol Excellence in Diversity Award by the New Jersey Bar Association, and received the Professional Achievement Award from the Asian Pacific American Lawyers Association of New Jersey. Additionally, she was the inaugural recipient of the Distinguished Alumni Award conferred by the Rutgers Law School Minority Student Program. Her pro bono and community activities include service as a member of the NJ State Advisory Committee to the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights, counsel to the Organization of Chinese Americans-NJ Chapter, and counsel to the Women's Political Caucus of New Jersey. Additionally, Ms. Fong has served as a Trustee of the New Jersey State Bar Association and co-chaired its Diversity Committee. She is a past President of the Asian Pacific American Lawyers Association of New Jersey and member of its Advisory Board. Currently, she serves as a Director of the New Jersey Women Lawyers Association. Ms. Fong has been a member of the Rutgers Board of Governors as well as the Rutgers Board of Trustees.

Ms. Fong earned a B.A. in Political Science and a Certificate in Women's Studies from Douglass College at Rutgers University, and a J.D. from Rutgers University School of Law in Newark. She is admitted to the bar in New Jersey, New York and various federal courts.



David S. Leonardis

Captain, NJ State Police (Retired)

Dave Leonardis is the Training & Outreach Liaison for the Office of the Attorney General, Division of Criminal Justice, Prosecutors Supervision & Training Bureau. In that role, he is responsible for specialized training for law enforcement officers, as directed by the Attorney General and the Director of the New Jersey Division of Criminal Justice. His duties also include law enforcement and community outreach for the State of New Jersey. Dave works with law enforcement and government agencies, as well as community and faith-based organizations in order to enhance community relations on a local and

State level. He is currently the Vice-President of the NJ Bias Crime Officers Association. Mr. Leonardis received the 2019 Community Outreach Award for the Division of Criminal Justice from Governor Phil Murphy and the 2019 Attorney General's Award for Outstanding Contribution to a Special Project. Dave currently is also the State Chief Resiliency Officer for New Jersey, overseeing the New Jersey State Law Enforcement Resiliency Program. He holds the title of Vice-President for the New Jersey Bias Crimes Officers Association and delivers Bias Awareness training to members of the community and law enforcement throughout New Jersey. In addition, he oversees the DELTA Leadership Course for the State of New Jersey.

Dave was the Chief for the Outreach and Special Projects Bureau at the New Jersey Office of Homeland Security & Preparedness (OHSP). He was responsible for overseeing special projects and developing private sector outreach programs. In that role, he has developed statewide outreach programs and partnerships with operators of malls, sports/entertainment venues, hotels, casinos, airports, motor coach, motor truck, taxi, limousines associations, correctional facilities, military bases and faith based groups. He helped implement the NJ Interfaith Advisory Council for OHSP. For his outreach efforts, he received the 2011 Law Enforcement Officer of the Year Award from the NJ Retail Merchants Association and NJ Food Council, the Peace Island Institute (Turkish-Muslim organization) Government Achievement Award in 2012 and the Attorney General's Award for Excellence in Public Outreach in 2013.

Prior to being the Chief for Outreach and Special Projects, he was the OHSP Training Bureau Chief, responsible for development and delivery of counter-terrorism and domestic preparedness training programs. Prior to that position, he was the Chairman of the Domestic Security Preparedness Planning Group, which was part of the Domestic Security Preparedness Task Force, under the Office of the Attorney General. The Planning Group was responsible for developing homeland security plans for the State of New Jersey.

Dave served 29 years with the New Jersey State Police before retiring at the rank of Captain and the Executive Officer of the Investigations Section. Dave had a variety of criminal investigation assignments during his career with State Police, including Narcotics, Organized Crime, Arson, Cargo Theft & Robbery, Official Corruption and others. He was cited for his work involving terrorism-related cases that received national attention: the Brinks Armored Car Robbery in Nyack, New York, where four police officers, security guards were killed by members of the Weathermen Underground

and the Black Liberation Army. He was also cited for his work on the Trooper Lamonaco homicide investigation and the capture of members of the United Freedom Front, a domestic terrorist group responsible for Tpr. Lamonaco's death. The United Freedom Front were on the Federal Bureau of Investigation's Ten Most Wanted List for a series of bombings and bank robberies that occurred prior to and after the murder of Trooper Lamonaco. All members of the group were captured in what turned out to be the largest manhunt since the Lindbergh kidnapping.

Dave served as the Commandant of the New Jersey State Police Training Academy where he received the "Team/Partnership Achievement Award" from Acting Governor Donald DiFrancesco, the Meritorious Award from New Jersey State Police Superintendent Carson Dunbar and the "Employee Recognition Award" from Attorney General John Farmer for his work in re-engineering the Academy's curriculum and in-service training program. He was cited by the federal monitors overseeing the Consent Decree on Racial Profiling for his part in designing a training plan to develop a positive organizational culture and structure.

Mr. Leonardis received a B.S. from William Paterson College and a Master's Degree in General Education from Seton Hall University. He was an adjunct professor in the Criminology Department at The College of New Jersey, and taught at Seton Hall University's Education and Human Resource Departments and currently teaches in the Monmouth University Criminal Justice Graduate program.



Harpreet Singh Mokha

National Program Manager

Harpreet Singh Mokha serves as the National Program Manager on issues regarding the Muslim, Arab, Sikh, South Asian and Hindu (MASSAH) communities at the Community Relations Service (CRS), U.S. Department of Justice. Harpreet works with law enforcement, government, civil rights groups, faith-based groups, and other community organizations across the country to share information and foster dialogues on ways to prevent and respond to alleged hate crimes against MASSAH communities.

Prior to this role, Harpreet had served as the Mid-Atlantic Regional Director for CRS for seven years, where he has worked with law enforcement, federal, state and local government officials, community leaders, and federal agencies to provide support in addressing tensions associated with allegations of discrimination on the basis of race, color, and national origin.

His work includes helping communities develop resources to effectively prevent and respond to violent hate crimes committed on the basis of actual or perceived race, color, national origin, gender, gender identity, sexual orientation, religion, or disability. Additionally, Harpreet has worked closely with law enforcement and community leaders to conduct trainings, design and facilitate dialogues, and identify opportunities to increase community engagement.

Harpreet joined CRS at the Department of Justice after serving as a civil rights attorney and the Legal Director of UNITED SIKHS in Washington, D.C. As Legal Director, Harpreet was involved in numerous outreach initiatives, served to create cultural programs, and conducted educational seminars with federal, state, and local government agencies to increase awareness of issues faced by the Sikh American community. He has extensive experience in providing legal guidance and counseling on issues such as civil rights and liberties violations, post 9/11 backlash, airport profiling, employment discrimination, and immigration law.

Harpreet earned his Juris Doctor from Michigan State University College of Law and Bachelor's degrees in Finance and Human Resource Management from the University of Houston.



Manjusha P. Kulkarni

Executive Director of AAPI Equity Alliance

Manjusha P. Kulkarni (Manju) is Executive Director of AAPI Equity Alliance (AAPI Equity), which serves and represents the 1.5 million Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders in Los Angeles County. In March 2020, Manju co-founded Stop AAPI Hate, the nation's leading aggregator of COVID-19-related hate incidents against AAPIs.

In 2021, Manju was recognized by *TIME* magazine as one of the 100 most influential individuals and by Bloomberg/

Business Week as one of the 50 individuals "with the ability to move markets or shape ideas and policies" with the co-founders of Stop AAPI Hate, Cynthia Choi and Russell Jeung. Cynthia, Russell and Manju also were awarded the 2021 Webby Social Movement of the Year.

Manju's work has been featured in the New York Times, and on CBS News and CNN, as well as in numerous ethnic media outlets. Manju is a member of the Los Angeles City Ethics Commission and was recently appointed to the California Racial and Identity Profiling Advisory Board by CA Assembly Speaker Anthony Rendon.

In 2014, she received the White House Champions of Change award from President Barack Obama for her dedication to improving health care access for Asians American communities. In March 2021, she testified before Congress at the House Judiciary Committee on the issue of anti-Asian hate.

Manju holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from Duke University and a Juris Doctor degree from Boston University School of Law. Manju lives in Los Angeles with her daughters Vaishali and Meghana and her husband Shai Halbe.




Nidhi Ummettala

Rise, an organization that empowers parents involved in the child welfare system.



cases involving discrimination based on sex, race, and disability. She also advises DCR staff on investigations and counsels on emerging issues.

Prior to working with the Division of Law, she served as a law clerk to the Honorable Mark M. Russello in New Jersey Superior Court in the Civil Division and law secretary/clerk to the Honorable Eileen Bransten in New York State Supreme Court in the Commercial Division.

She received her J.D. from Benjamin N. Cardozo School of Law and her A.B. from Princeton University.

She grew up in Bergen County and recently moved from Hudson to Union County.
