Program Summary

Drafting is a bottleneck and pressure point in almost every law office. Most lawyers draft new documents by finding old documents and modifying them to work for the next case or client. The presenter will lay out the roadmap for professional template-building; and demonstrate the spectrum of automation tools from the amazing things a word processor is already capable of to document assembly applications.
